If I wanted to teach online, I wouldn't start here

On 12 March 2020, in response to the Covid-19 situation, Taoiseach Leo Varadkar announced that all schools, colleges and universities would move online from the next day. The Irish National Digital Experience (INDEX) Survey, carried out in November 2019, indicates that 70% of staff who teach in higher education in Ireland had never taught in a live online environment. This underscores the challenge faced by teaching staff during the “pivot”, using available technologies to complete the academic year.

The IUA-led Enhancing Digital Teaching and Learning (EDTL) project commenced in early 2019, with the goal to enhance the digital learning environment for students and develop the digital skills of all who teach in Irish universities. While the Covid-19 virus accelerated the use of digital tools to support teaching and learning, this largely happened in the context of continuity of teaching and without pedagogical considerations. In particular, the student digital learning experience was certainly not enhanced during the initial pivot.

The EDTL project team recognized a small window of opportunity to support staff who teach to prepare for more effective remote teaching in the next academic year. The EDTL Approach, a pathway with key considerations for those who are adapting a single module or a whole programme, normally taught wholly or partly face-to-face, was developed. Centering the student digital learning experience, the project re-focused to collate a small set of key resources.

I will share our experiences on the development of the EDTL approach with a focus on the perspectives of both staff and students in managing the challenges of the remote context and the resources developed with a key focus on optimizing the student learning experience.

Sharon Flynn is Project Manager for Enhancing Digital Capacity in Teaching and Learning in Irish Universities, a 3 year project funded through the Higher Education Authority Innovation and Transformation Programme. She works closely with senior academic leaders and project team members across the university sector to develop the digital confidence, skills and competences of those who teach in Irish universities and enhance the digital learning experience of Irish university students

The Library at home – Reaching our Students

This presentation will cover UCD College Liaison Librarian's development of online supports in reaction to the seismic shift in working patterns experienced. It will highlight the responsive development of online tutorials, infographics and welcome packages to reach and support students studying at home. Aspects of inherent communication strategies, challenges and impact will also be touched on.

Susan Boyle is the College Liaison Librarian for Business and Law at UCD Library which she moved to after spending time as the Nursing, Midwifery & Medicine Librarian. Prior to taking up her role at UCD, she worked as Science Subject Librarian at Trinity College Dublin. Before becoming an Academic Librarian, Susan held posts in private sector Research and Advertising. In her current role as College Liaison Librarian, her main focus is on Teaching and Learning, Liaison activities and the development of 'subject specialist' creative learning supports. She holds a key lead on her team with responsibility for 'Communication Strategy'. Susan's research to date has focused on horizon scanning, creativity in teaching, and Game Based Learning. She was instrumental in winning the bid for UCD and organizing the LILAC 2016 Conference. She is a peer reviewer for an Information Literacy Journal and has won EAHIL awards in this sphere. Currently she is actively involved with BIALL and BLA (National Law and Business Library Groups). More recently, she has developed and launched an online parenting and caring supports initiative at UCD Library in support of the wider UCD Community.

Jenny Collery has worked in UCD since 2006 as a Liaison Librarian/College Liaison Librarian to both Medicine & Diagnostic Imaging and the College of Arts & Celtic Studies. As part of these roles she has worked closely with the schools to ensure they, and their students, get the most of the library services. Her lead area is Academic Integrity development and support. As part of this Jenny created UCD Library's Academic Integrity Guide. She previously worked setting up UCD's Institutional Repository and as a Cataloguer. Other areas where Jenny has worked include Research administration, e-Learning, IT Training, and Education. Jennifer has a degree in Psychology and a Higher Diploma in Library and Information Skills.

Ready, steady, LETS go!

This presentation will discuss the benefits of applying an iterative design process to an online information literacy tutorial (LETS) for undergraduate students. Through continual development and collaboration, the tutorial now underpins the design and delivery of online and blended classes by DCU's Subject Librarians. Harnessing the capabilities of the University VLE, academic staff can embed some or all elements in their course/module pages to meet specific learning and assessment objectives. In addition, the tutorial has been repurposed for use in a University wide initiative aimed at students transitioning to University. Examples will be used throughout with particular reference to recent experiences during COVID.

Lisa is DCU Library's Information and Digital Literacy Coordinator and Subject Librarian to the Faculty of Computing & Engineering. She has worked as a Subject Librarian (in various disciplines) for over 20 years. She is responsible for the development, promotion and oversight of information literacy programmes and initiatives. She works with a team Subject Librarians at DCU to ensure the effective integration of IL learning outcomes and interventions into course curricula. She also coordinates and manages the ongoing development of LETS and other online learning resources and supports.
